Spring Online Sale

We decided in early March to survey our membership to see if there was any interest in hosting a Spring Online Sale. As it turns out, in less than 60 days we ended up with 21 consignors. We chose to use DP Online Sales' platform to take advantage of their technology and Simmental breed expertise/contacts. In addition, our generous membership donated genetic lots to be used as a fund-raiser for the Missouri Junior Simmental Assoc. who are hosting the South-Central Junior Regional in Springfield, MO on June 21-24. We grossed just over \$34K, which included \$5,514 for the juniors. In addition, we had 21 buyers from 8 states of which 17 are new buyers that have not purchased from our Fall Harvest sale in the last 2 years.

Since Missouri is the #3 state for beef cows and an average herd size of 36, it just seems logical that many Simmental breeders are looking for alternative solutions from the local sale barn to market their registered cattle. We would like to keep the Spring Sale going every year and would love to hear your thoughts on how we can develop other programs to help market Simmentals in the state of Missouri.

Here's a challenge for all of us:

Anyone that has tried to sell Simmental or SimAngus bulls to a new commercial customer has heard this; "I swore I would never use another Simmental bull again after the problems we had with calving ease, high birth weights and lack of calf vigor back in the 70's and 80's." First of all, what a memory these guys have, right? Secondly, the Simmental breed has made huge advancements since then, so why can't we tell our story in a way that convinces them to try Simmental again?

Simmental cows' mature weights are on average less than Angus and Hereford.

Many people say that we have over-corrected on calving ease and our calves on average are too small.

There's a Superior Livestock study that shows Simmental influenced calves bring a premium when sold as feeders.

There is arguably more scientific data available on Simmental genetics than any breed on the planet.

So, the question remains, what do we need to do to convince people to try Simmental again?

And don't forget, the Fall Harvest Sale is November 4, 2023 in Springfield and the Spring Online Sale will be in April 2024.

Dr. Craig Payne, DVM of the University of Missouri discussed important changes in the rules for the sale of over-the-counter cattle antibiotics now being fully implemented. Cattle producers will need a prescription from their veterinarian to purchase the commonly used antibiotics deemed medically important because they are also used in human medicine.





Randy Schilling of Boehringer-Ingelheim reviewed the Four Pillars of Sustainable Deworming to improve parasite control and reduce the rate of parasite resistance to wormers.

Last time we asked: Which bull that sold in this past Winter/Spring sale season intrigues you the most?


The Triangle J Sale always offers several bulls that enter A.I. service for performance oriented Simmental and SimAngus breeders. This year's top selling bull was TJ Klondike 549K (ASA 4065070) a son of



Square B True North 8052 (Angus) out of an up-and-coming TJ donor that boasts a Cowboy Cut x TJ Sharper Image pedigree, that said, Klondike is heavily stacked for maternal superiority.

He has a balanced EPD profile with top 15% yearling weight and top 5% API, Frame 6, 38.5 cm scrotal.

In the Angus herdbook True North has already cracked into the top 25 sires for 2022 de-

Sires and was fourth in progeny registered. As a bonus to Missouri breeders True North is in the top 1% for the new Angus Hair Shed EPD. Klondike semen is available from ABS. (Wayne Vanderwert)

Tim Erickson submitted the following: Sifting through the big bull sale catalogs in January through April is always fun, then seeing the best ones pop up in the AI stud books a few weeks later. Wayne

asked for an intriguing purebred coming out of the 2023 season. Here is my take...Take a look at CLRS King James 616K, (ASA 4031931). API and TI are top 1%, cow family and sire really picking up steam, but two things stand out to me beyond that. He is an absolute power bull, pushing right at 6 frame with breed topping weaning and yearling growth. Second, he is very free and natural on the move, keeping his top level and maintaining neck and head placement while tracking wide and true. If the cow keeps them cleaned up I believe he might make some commercially useful, breed improving ones who you can halter and have fun with as well.



I have to pick an honorable mention, working in the Show-Me State for breeder Lee Simmental Farm



and new owner Shoal Creek Simmental. LLSF High ProfileJ903 (ASA 4062764) won Grand at State Fair last summer ,as did his mama LLSF Alley's Lady a couple years before. Again, his numbers center toward growth and power but what jumps out to me is his beautiful combo of middle, volume, and rib along with tremendous flex in his joints and spine along with beautiful, correct angles when he moves. He is also stout enough and attractive to at least hold the spot in breeding programs held by his daddy, Executive Order.
